Message from our Ministers...

Dear friends,

I squirm at the majority of portrayals of Christian faith and especially clergy which we encounter on TV, but then I rejoice at the moments when a writer captures something of truth and even more occasionally something of faith in their characters. From the joy and comedy of rural life in The Vicar of Dibley, to the comic profundity and honesty of Rev. played by the brilliant Tom Hollander and my all-time favourite, Call the Midwife, where life & faith are so intimately entwined.

But I believe one of the most powerful pieces of television that I have witnessed is Jimmy McGovern's Broken starring Sean Bean as a Catholic priest in a northern English city, who despite suffering from his own troubles stemming from a traumatic childhood, tries to guide several of his most vulnerable parishioners through the trials and tribulations of everyday life.

The 6-part series, faces us with some of the most shattering truths and deepest struggles of our privileged society; poverty, mental health, suicide, family challenges, abuse – to name but





a few. It certainly is not viewing for the fainthearted; it is rated at 15 for good reason. In the series the priest seeks to fulfil his calling to be the hands, the feet, the face and the voice of Jesus, yet we also see the deep vulnerability of his humanity in the midst of this. In his own brokenness, he feels he has failed many, but the reality is ultimately different, and he is himself blessed by those that he has blessed.

Our Lenten preaching theme of 'Broken' reminds us that we live in a world that is incredibly fragile, and we are a fragile and broken people. But this TV series reminds us of a truth that I was reminded of this Ash Wednesday – what God can do with not just our brokenness, and not just the brokenness of this world, but the brokenness of a death on a cross.

"Going through the motions doesn't please you, a flawless performance is nothing to you. I learned God-worship when my pride was shattered. Heart-shattered lives ready for love don't for a moment escape God's notice."

The Work of Fairtrade



God has given me a deep sense of compassion for the plight of those living in desperate poverty in the developing world -Asia, Africa and South America. So how have I put this passion into practice?

From 1997-2019 I was

a voluntary Fair Trader, buying and selling Fairtrade foods and Fairly Traded craft items from organisations which specialised in acquiring them e.g. Traidcraft, Tearfund, Toybox, Fairtrade Foundation, Namaste, Divine Chocolate Company and a few others.

So how does Fairtrade make a difference? What is Fairtrade?

1. It is a FAIR PRICE for the farmers who grow crops like tea, coffee, cocoa, rice, cotton, dried fruits etc.

2. It has a SOCIAL PREMIUM added to the price. This helps the farmers' community to improve local schools, clinics, sanitation, roads etc.

The same two principles apply to the many CRAFT WORKERS who exercise skills with wool, cotton, leather, stone, jute and plants (for handmade paper).

In 2010 Roger and I went to India and visited cotton and rice farmers, embroiderers, stone carvers and batik workers. We saw the benefits of Fairtrade in action. Fairtrade is NOT charity. You can buy some things in ALDI, Sainsburys, Lidl

and Co-op supermarkets.

And also look out for me at the Easter Fayre at Swan Bank on Saturday 12th April from 11am to 2pm. Happy shopping!

Hope & Hospitality - Soup Kitchen Update



As many of you know, since last November, Swan Bank has been running a soup kitchen as part of our 'Church at the Margins' Hope & Hospitality strategy.

It became very clear last year that a soup kitchen was needed as there was a growing number of folks ringing the church doorbell asking for drinks and food. At that time, we could only provide a hot drink and a pot noodle.

Following a meeting called by Kathryn and Ruth last October, Swan Bank decided to introduce a weekly soup kitchen which opened on Thursday the 14th November in the coffee lounge, from 12pm – 2pm running through to the end of March 2025. The soup kitchen serves hot food to rough sleepers and anyone else who comes to us in need of support. Funding was provided by S-o-T City Council with volunteers mainly coming from Swan Bank.

Since opening, we have served around 350 guests, averaging 25 people per session. This equates to over 1,000 meals, as in addition to being served drinks and a hot meal (often consuming several bowls of lobby or sausage casserole followed by cake and custard), each guest can take a packed lunch and a portion of the day's meal in a sealed plastic container with them when they leave. By the end of March, I expect the total cost for food for 5 months will be in the region of £1,200.



As well as food, we also provide the opportunity for a hot shower, and many guests also leave with clean clothes (donated by members of Swan Bank).

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Our guests frequently tell us, that it is the warm welcome and atmosphere that has had the biggest impact on them. To feel cared for, treated with respect and not judged is, for many, a new experience.

With such positive feedback about the care we give, we were starting to feel that there was a need to continue beyond the end of March, partly due to feedback from our guests, but also from the team, as we all gain so much from being a part of the soup kitchen experience.

Having met recently with Kathryn and Ruth, I am happy to report that the soup kitchen will now continue from April onwards with a slightly different format that we feel will suit our guests better and will enable this vital work to continue.

We will now open every Monday from 10am -12pm, and every Thursday from 10am-1pm, serving breakfast/brunch. We will also continue to offer a packed lunch, a shower and change of clothing if

needed.

We hope to secure further funding from S-o-T City Council to support our ongoing work, and volunteers have already signed



up for the new rota. On behalf of our Ministers and myself, I would like to express our sincere thanks to all who have given their time to make our soup kitchen work so effectively. Finally, I have two requests -

1. I am looking for 6 members of the congregation to bake on a rota, either; flapjacks, fruitcake or cookies to go into the lunch bags

2. If you feel that you would like to join the soup kitchen hospitality team (subject to the Methodist safer recruitment process) then please have a chat with me or speak to **Liz Thompson** in the office. You only need to commit to as much as suits you.

The Amazing Work of our Tech and Worship Teams



My name is Immie; commonly seen at the back of the church with a headset on, ensuring that our Sunday services can reach you at home. I first joined the tech team back in April 2020 to help support with streaming our Lockdown Sunday services. I had very little experience

initially, however, five years later, I now pride myself in my ability to camera operate, vision mix and direct our live streams and 'special occasion' services. But what do these fancy words mean?

If I'm operating a camera, then typically I'm trying to make sure that the service is as visible as possible to our online audience. We have seven cameras in use per service (I know!), however only two of them require an operator since the others remain static.



My primary role is vision mixing; therefore, it is my decision as to what content to broadcast. I use three different computer screens; two of them show me visuals from all the cameras and one shows my feed from the YouTube and Facebook livestreams. I will tell the camera operators what shots I want and when (for example, I might ask one of them for a shot of the worship leader whilst the other gets me a shot of the drummer). I will use a small control panel to 'mix' (select) the shots which will broadcast to the stream in real time – which leaves no room for error on my part or on the camera operators!

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Occasionally, I will direct our services which essentially means overseeing the running order. It requires me to have good knowledge of what is happening at each point of the service, who needs to be on the platform and when, and any extra technical additions. I will also lead the pre-service meeting to ensure that all members of the tech and worship team understand the running order.

I really love being apart of the tech team at Swanbank because it makes our services accessible to people at home. I work with an incredibly talented and dedicated group of people who willingly give up their time on a Sunday to ensure the gospel can be heard by as many people as possible. I am looking forward to the next five years of streaming our services!

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Agape, God's special gift of love

Agape is almost always used to describe the love that is of and from God, whose very nature is love itself: "God is love" (1 John 4:8). God does not merely love; He is love. Everything God does flows from His love. Agape is also used to describe our love for God (Luke 10:27), a servant's faithful respect to his master (Matthew 6:24), and a man's attachment to things (John 3:19).


The type of love that characterizes God is not a soppy, sentimental feeling such as we often hear portrayed. God loves because that is His nature and the expression of His being. He loves the unlovable and the unlovely, not because we deserve to be loved or because of any excellence we possess, but because it is His nature to love.

Agape love is always shown by what it does. God's love is displayed most clearly at the cross. "God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved" (Ephesians 2:4–5).

We did not deserve such a sacrifice, "but God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8).

God's agape love is unmerited, gracious, and constantly seeking the benefit of the ones He loves. The Bible says we are the undeserving recipients of His lavish agape love (1 John 3:1). God's demonstration of agape love led to the sacrifice of the Son of God for those He loves.

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Agape love does not come naturally to us. Because of our fallen nature, we are incapable of producing such a love. If we are to love as God loves, that love—that agape—can only come from its source. This is the love that has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us when we became His children.

This is how we know what love is. Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. Because of God's love toward us, we are able to love one another.

Prayer

Thanks be to God for his free gift of love. We are forever grateful for the act of extreme love shown to us through our Lord's Death and Resurrection. We are thankful that nothing can separate us from the Love of God. We are thankful that we have Hope for our future no matter what struggles we may face. Help us Lord to draw ever closer to your heart and trust in your promises.
